

Verbals—Participial Phrases*Reteaching*

A **verbal** is a word that is a verb form but acts as a different part of speech.

A **participle** is a verbal that acts as an adjective and modifies a noun or pronoun.

A waving flag caught my eye. (The present participle *waving* modifies *flag*.)

Surprised, I blinked in disbelief. (The past participle *Surprised* modifies *I*.)

A **participial phrase** consists of a participle plus its modifiers and complements.

Waving my hand to the bus driver, I ran toward the stop. (The participial phrase *Waving my hand to the bus driver* modifies *I*.)

Surprised by my sudden arrival, the driver braked sharply. (The participial phrase *Surprised by my sudden arrival* modifies *driver*.)
