

Prepositional Phrases

Reteaching

A prepositional phrase consists of a preposition, its object, and any modifiers of the object.

Scientists observe stars through a telescope. (The preposition is through.)

An adverb phrase modifies a verb, an adjective, or another adverb.

We see many stars with the naked eye. (The phrase modifies see, telling how.)

An adjective phrase modifies a noun or a pronoun.

Light from the stars travels quickly. (The phrase modifies light, telling what kind.)
