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# Nominative and Objective Cases

Reteaching

Personal pronouns change their case depending on whether they function as subjects or as objects. Personal pronouns that function as subjects or as predicate nominatives are in the **nominative case**.

	First Person	Second Person	Third Person
Singular	1	you	he, she, it
Plural	we	you .	they

Personal pronouns that function as direct objects, indirect objects, or as objects of prepositions are in the **objective case**. Also use the objective case of the pronoun when it is part of a compound object construction.
