

Chapter 17: The Clause**Sentence Structure B**

A **compound-complex sentence** contains two or more independent clauses and *at least* one subordinate clause.

Chess, which is a game of wit and skill, can be rewarding, but it can also be discouraging. [There are two independent clauses: *Chess can be rewarding* and *it can also be discouraging*. There is one subordinate clause: *which is a game of wit and skill*.]
